Every year we struggle with the words to use to start our annual newsletter. Duck hunting season was fabulous as it always is. Our guests, guided by Billy, Archie, Eddie and Frank, camouflaged in our custom built blinds, were well compensated for their accurate shooting.

Now, as the cold weather settles in, yours truly (the Crew) will start planning for next year. We should be attending an additional sport show this winter, one more than last year, and more likely it will be in the Pittsburgh P.A. area. Our goal is to increase our waterfowl hunting packages to make up for a slower time of the year for us.



Six seasons completed and under our belt. It certainly does not feel like it, however the daily work generated by this place is literally becoming second nature to us. We again had a tremendous season because of you. Fishing was good throughout the entire period with a slight dip towards the end of August. The water temperature cooled down quickly in the latter part of the season resulting in some awesome walleye fishing deep in the channels a few hundred yards away from the lodge. It certainly was cold to fish but the rewards were there.



Changes in 2006

Those who have joined us during the 2006 season have witnessed some changes at the lodge. These changes include:

- Major changes to cabin 11A's footing structure to stabilize the cabin
- Several cabins were fully painted on the outside including Cabin # 12, 11A, 11, and 10



The algae bloom was minimal this year compared to last year. We think this is the direct result of a more seasonal temperature pattern during the latter part of the season. One thing to mention, Oct 12th and 13th, 2006 will be remembered as the two coldest days on Memquisit's record with snow falling and accumulating for two consecutive days topped by a full camp nearly freezing to death. Now, those who braved the element to fish, more than limited out on walleye fishing everyday.



Proposed changes for 2007

- Fix the siding on cabin 6 deck
- Flowers in the front and side of the lodge
- Addition of chlorinators for the water systems throughout the cabins



- Repairs of the two pump houses found near cabin 11 and between cabin 3 & 3A.
- Repair deck at cabin 4
- New steps for cabin 1, 5, 4, 10 and 12
- Purchase of a 24ft Pontoon boat for rental and tours
- Purchase of a mini excavator to allow us to perform work around the lodge



- New roof over the game room and office at the main lodge
- New propane fryers at the lodge

- Refurbish cabin 12's bathroom.
- Re-enforce and re-brace cabin 3A's roof.
- Change cabin 11's kitchen and living room flooring.
- Beds in Cabin 2 and 11.
- Change all of the meal plan windows.
- Repair Cabin 3A and 10's decks.
- Repairs to back kitchen's roof.
- New refrigerator in cabin 10.
- New silverware, cups and wine glass cupboards in the lodge's dining room.
- 2 to 4 new boats



Every year we pick at a trail system that leads to the far end cabins number 10 to 12. This trail system will not be for vehicles but rather for motorized access to the area to allow us to perform any work there more effectively. We are also investigating the possibility of building access to the island where cabins 1 through to 3 are located. The critical area is of course the waterway crossing. This will require ingenuity.



Steps are underway to sever 2 to 3 acre lots on the property boundaries. It is hoped that within 2 years these will be made available for sale. They will be fully accessible lots with power available to each of their boundary. We estimate that approximately 20 waterfront lots will become available for sale. 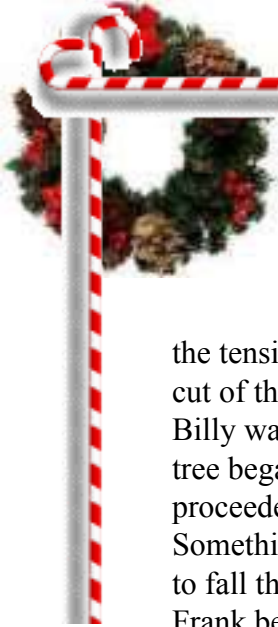


On July 17th, 2006 we've experienced a severe windstorm (micro-bursts) the likes we had never experienced before. A large number of trees were uprooted throughout the property creating potential future damages to our cabin.

You see a detailed view of where all the rocks are and how far away you are from them. The boat is also equipped with a fish finder, a 60 hp Yamaha motor, and a change room with a porta-potty.

New Pet Policy


Memquisit Lodge has always been and will most likely remain a pet friendly lodge. As mentioned in prior correspondence, we understand and respect the fact that pets are an important part of your families. In the first 6 years of operating this lodge, we have always struggled with the fact that pets also represent a problem to which an easy solution is not readily available. In this context we know that it is imperative that we do come up with an answer so that we can lessen the work that is required to do by our cleaning crew on our change over day.

Currently, on the day of your departure we ask you to vacate the cabin before 10:00 a.m. so that we may get into the cabin and prepare it for the next group coming in by 2:00 p.m.

on the very same day. It is imperative that our cleanup crew accomplishes the cleaning of up to 17 cabins in an allotted time of 4 hours from check out to check in. In nearly all cases pet hair is found abundantly throughout the cabin where pets were present. As you are aware it is extremely difficult to effectively remove pet hair from bed linens, blankets, couches, chairs and floors. To properly do so, extra time is required thus reducing our crew's ability to complete their work on time. Our crew must perform the cleaning to the standards we set out and not below that. If pet hair is found, it needs to be removed without any exceptions. In one word pet hair costs us additional money.

Many lodges faced with the very same problem have opted to refuse pets altogether. Some who still allow pets are charging a nightly rate of as much as \$25 per night for each pet brought over. We do not want to have to resort to this at least not for now. Instead we are going to establish new policies for pets. As part of these policies a user fee will be established and be charged to pet owners whose pet hair is found excessively in any of our cabins. In addition, we will check in your pet as you come in similar to how we check you in. At this time you will be made aware of all the rules and regulations concerning pets. It is hoped that with your cooperation this problem will resolve itself with no further need to act on the subject.

We do everything in our power to keep our expenses down, still inflation is inflation and we are very subject to it. Cabin repairs are needed and will continue to be at the top of the agenda. For 2007 our rates will go up by 4% for most of our cabins with the exception of cabin 3A whose increase will be 2.5% and cabin 3 where no increase will be set for 2007. Our weekly boat & motor price is rising by 2½ % while our daily boat & motor price will remain the same for 2007.

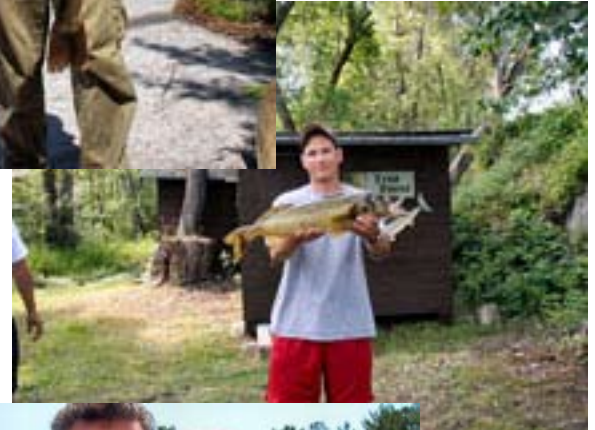

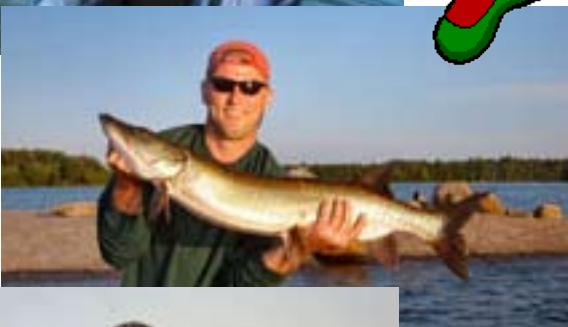

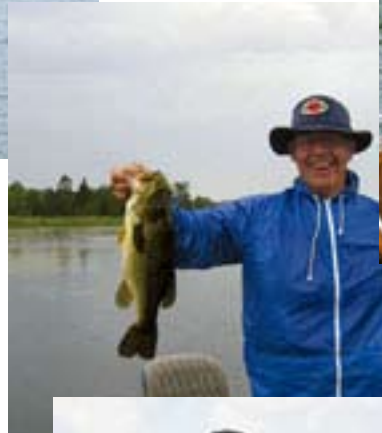

Bass, Bass, Bass

We had a great season for bass both large and small mouth.



Our small outpost lakes brought us some of the nicest bass this season, we have added another small lake to our list for next year.

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I must say that this years hunt was the largest we catered to since we've opened. We had in excess of 30 hunters throughout the fall. The season brought us more hunters on opening morning, 9 to be exact plus guides. The balance of our groups came in October looking for the northern ducks. Although the mallards were down this year there were more blue bills a complete reverse of last year. We still had a great variety of birds and some beautiful shoots.



Here is a little bit of info on what are all those rock formations found along our highways and lakes shoreline.

What is an Inukshuk ?



Inukshuk (singular) means “likeness of a person” in Inuktitut (Inuit language) and is a well known symbol in Northern Canada. They are made rock slabs, large and small and built into the shape of a person with their arms or legs out stretched or more traditionally, piles of well mapped out rocks.

Inukshuit (plural) are used to guide or channel caribou into areas where Inuit can easily harvest them. An open leg on an Inukshuk found near water or a coastline points to an open channel for passage to navigate your way, and if the Inukshuk is in the middle of land, the open leg points towards a valley as a route to pass through the mountains.

The open (longer) arm of an Inukshuk points you in the direction you should be going. A marker Inukshuk placed near a lake shows that the fish can be found in the lake at the exact same distance the Inukshuk is placed from the shoreline. Stone markers also mark food caches along a path (this type of marker is more a pile of stones and sometimes the caribou antlers will be placed on top so you know what food is there)

The purpose attributed to Inukshuit is that they serve as markers, or signposts, to help guide Inuit across the treeless tundra of the Canadian Arctic.
